Fungi are essential to the Community of Trees

Fungi form an immense network of mostly underground roots which are essential to the life and wellbeing of trees, often host specific.

They provide the trees with nutrients and act as channels for water but they also form part of the communication of trees, warning them, for example, of danger.

Some networks of fungi are thousands of years old and cover an immense area in a forest.

The fungus penetrates and develops the tree's roots and also allows its web to roam through the surrounding forest floor, thus extending the reach of the tree's own roots.

A kind of network is so created.

Now it is easier for the trees to exchange vital nutrients and even information such as an impending insect attack.

This connection makes fungi something like the forest internet.
